

Three dozen homes were damaged, some destroyed, when a tornado skipped across the south side of Elizabethtown on Wednesday morning. The twister took aim for a trailer park and nearby homes. Metal roofing and insulation littered the Pine Tree Mobile Home Park. The mobile home park suffered the most damage. Residents said their trailers shook violently when the storm hit. Dorothy Noe's house was hit by the tornado. She says her elderly mother was lifted six inches off the floor and glass was flying everywhere.

Grayson County was also hit by the severe weather. A suspected tornado carved out a two-mile path near Leitchfield. Two people were injured in Grayson County, one was taken to a hospital

in Louisville. The storms also destroyed several homes and buildings.

In Muhlenberg County, several roofs were blown off of homes and buildings, and the roof of a middle school gym was torn from the building. At least one mobile home was destroyed. There were no reports of injuries in Muhlenberg County.

Finally, there was damage to homes in Hopkins County, but no reports of injuries.
