

MARCH 5, 1942

The store room soon to be vacated by H. W. Jolly and Son will be occupied shortly thereafter by Guy L. Comer and Associates of Nashville under the probable name of "Standard Stores." Mr. Jolly expects to re-open his establishment in a room next door to the L. C. Ellis Drugstore which is now nearing completion following extensive remodeling.

History repeated itself last night when the Glasgow Scotties came out victorious in the finals, as they did last year, in the 19th District Basketball Tournament. To do so, they piled up a score of 38 to 22 over the Cave City team. The Glasgow Scotties, as district champion, and Cave City, as runner-up will play in the Regional in Bowling Green.

Dr. William Wells, associate of Dr. W. A. Weldon, today received his commission as 1st Lieutenant, Medical Corps, and completed the "transaction" by accomplishing his oath of office. Orders providing his service in the Army may be expected in a short time.

Dr. Rex E. Hayes and Dr. John Dickinson were in Fort Knox yesterday where they received physical examinations prior to be called into military service as officers of the Medical Corps. It is rumored that two other local doctors may soon receive similar "invitations."

A three-week strike at Wolf Creek Dam was reported "settled" yesterday following an agreement which provided for the workers returning to work at their present wage scale, many of them receiving more than \$1.00 per hour, pending recommendation of government authorities as to an increase. One disgruntled worker is said to have been quite huffed that he was not permitted to keep on working, saying that he was happy to be making \$1.00 per hour since he had "never made a dollar a day over there before this work started."

The first action of its kind to be acted upon by the Barren County Recycling Board was taken care of when a permit was approved for delivery of a new car from Travis Chevrolet Company of Cave City to Mrs. L. T. Chevasser, of Cave City. Arrangements for the purchase of the car were completed prior to the January 1 ban on delivery.

Mr. L. Kidd, who has been proprietor of a machine shop here for several years, leaves tomorrow for Washington, where he will take special work, and expects to return to Glasgow to open a shop and make guns for Uncle Sam.

Ten of the 37 boys from Barren County who were inducted last week were due to have arrived in Fort Lewis, Washington (near Tacoma) Tuesday according to a letter from Burnett Davidson. Along with Davidson were James Redford, Clem Ard, Elmer Britt, Noah Burgess, Paul Byrd, Ray Clark, Raymond Cook, Noble Geron and Woodie Houchens. Also among the 360 men on the troop train were several boys from Adair and Monroe Counties.

“Third Time Is Charm” proved true for Glasgow today when they met Lewisburg in the opening game of the 5th Regional Basketball Tournament here this afternoon. In two previous regional encounters in other years, Lewisburg was the winner but this afternoon, the Scotties got in that old ball game and won by two points, 32-30, in a hard-fought game which kept the fans, as well as the players, breathless.

On Friday night, Glasgow plays Bowling Green, and Franklin will meet against Fountain Run. Winners of Friday night games will play Saturday night to determine regional champion which will advance to the state contest in Louisville next week.

MARCH 26, 1942

Funeral services will be held at Wilmore, KY on Friday, March 27 for the Rev. Henry Clay Morrison, one of America's outstanding Methodist pastors and evangelists, who died Tuesday night at Elizabethton, TN. The sudden death of this distinguished servant of God came in the midst of a revival which he was conducting in Elizabethton. Born at Bedford, KY, he came to Barren County when he was two years old, following the death of his mother, and was reared by his grandfather, Billy Morrison, in the vicinity of

the present day Morrison Park. The park, founded by Rev. Morrison, was originally established as "Pentecostal Park." Achievements, honors, and effects of his active career are of common knowledge to his thousands of friends throughout this section of the state, as well as across the nation.

Mr. Lacy Burton Doyle passed away early Tuesday morning, March 26, at the Community Hospital, where he had been a patient only since last Friday although he had been in ill health for some time. Mr. Doyle was born near Cave City on May 2, 1855, son of Gregg and Rettie Gardner Doyle. He was prominent in political circles in Barren County and had served as Deputy Sheriff for eight years. In 1937 he was elected Sheriff and served four years, having

completed his term less than three months ago. At the time of his death, he was County Tax Collector. His church membership was with the Glasgow Baptist Church, where his funeral service was conducted by Rev. Sam Ed Bradley. Burial was in the Glasgow Cemetery.

Rev. and Mrs. George Caroland are moving to Walton, KY where Rev. Caroland has accepted a call as pastor of the Christian Church in that city. He took official charge last Sunday but will continue his studies in Lexington three days a week until he graduates in June from the College of the Bible.

Thurman Lester Hibbitt, 16, was killed near Bon Ayr Saturday night when he stepped into the path of a passing car driven by Lloyd Smith of Richardsville. Hibbit and his twin brother, Raymon Chester, were returning home from Loving Spring, where they had attended church. He is survived by his mother, Otha Hibbitt, four brothers, five sisters, two half-sisters and a half-brother. Funeral services were held at the Rocky Hill Colored Baptist Church on Tuesday afternoon and burial was in the church cemetery.
