Each year, we have from 50 to 100 cases of typhoid fever in the county.

This disease can be stopped by (1) vaccination, (2) pure water, (3) safe milk and (4) elimination of flies and filth, all of which means proper sanitation. Clinic locations are listed in this paper, and we urge you to attend the one most convenient to you.
