Melvin Means, 44, was given a jail sentence of 90 days and fined \$500 in Jefferson County Court on charge of shooting Ralph Kinnaird, this city, in Louisville the night of August 6 as Kinnaird stood in front of the Kentucky Hotel. Means' plea was to the effect that he had been drinking for several days and his mind was blank at the time of the shooting.

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The local cavalry outfit has a plan underway for organization of a basketball team here to meet independent outfits of neighboring towns. All games will be played at the Armory under auspices of the cavalry troop.

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Officers are searching for Bill Mercer, operator of a blacksmith shop on Standpipe Hill, charging him with setting up and maintaining a still which was found running full blast in a room adjoining his shop. A quantity of liquor and the still itself were

confiscated but Mercer made his get-away.

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School Children To Have Help. The Junior Woman's Club is sponsoring a move to raise funds for indigent school children through the means of sealed milk bottles placed at public places in every store of the city. Donations will be placed in the bottles through a coin slit in the seal at the top of the bottle. These receptacles will be emptied each week by the Club, and proceeds will be used for food for hungry school children.
