Everett Denton Awarded Air Medal; Four Clusters. Staff Sgt. Everett L. Denton, a gunner with

the "Avenger" medium bombardment group in Sicily, has been awarded the Air Medal for meritorious service in flying bombing raids against the Axis. He has also qualified for four Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters by flying subsequent bombing missions. Against the Axis in Sicily, the Avenger dropped an impressive tonnage of bombs and turned in some of the finest precision bombing performances of the campaign against airdromes, harbors, supply points and communication lines. Nelson and Francis Renamed as Fire Department Heads. John M. Nelson and Russell Francis were re-elected as Chief and Assistant, respectively, of the Glasgow Fire Department at a meeting of the City Council at which time pay for all members of the Department was raised. Hereafter, truck drivers and pump operators will receive \$20 per month, and firemen will receive \$15. (1)

The Linder-Smith Toy Manufacturing Company has moved their machinery and equipment to a portion of the Trabue Electric Building in the Big Spring Bottom, where they will be in a better position to meet needs compelling an expansion of their activities. The firm manufactures a line of wooden toys, "Hoppity," now displayed at local stores, and for which they are flooded with orders from other large centers. One order this week from Louisville called for 144 each of the four models they now have in production. (1)
