Epidemic of Robberies, Safe-Blowing Reported. From reports received almost every morning now, local officers are facing one of the most serious conditions ever confronted in this city. On Saturday and Monday nights, a total of six forced entrances were reported and two others were attempted which apparently did not succeed. Officers are conducting intensive investigation while the City Council ponders questions of hiring additional officers. With winter coming on, and unemployment continuing at its present ebb, opinion has been expressed by many that very drastic steps will have to be adopted to cope with the situation.

Frank Haynes Has Leg Amputated. Frank Haynes, about 54, deaf and otherwise afflicted, submitted to an operation Monday at the Community Hospital for removal of a leg in which gangrene had set up. Haynes had been run over last week by a truck driven by a Tompkinsville man, who immediately took Haynes to the hospital and arranged for his treatment. Haynes was discharged the latter part of the week and removed to the home of relatives in the Finney section, but afterward complications arose that necessitated his return to the hospital and the subsequent operation.

Their home burned last week and they lost everything they had – even the barn, five acres of tobacco, feed, and chickens. Not one thing was saved; no insurance. Youth Loses Foot in Automobile Accident. Earl Etherton suffered the amputation of his right foot following injuries received to that foot and ankle, which were badly bruised and mangled last Friday night. He was riding on the running board of a Ford coupe when it crashed into a telephone pole on South Jacksonway. A companion, Jess Sharp, also suffered painful injuries in the same car and is confined in Community Hospital. The driver, Nick Dodson, and his two small sons escaped injury, as did Rose Middleton and Rufus Smith, who were riding on the other running board.

Reward Offered for Harry Hoover's Arrest. A reward of \$150 has been offered by Governor Laffoon for the arrest and delivery of Harry Hoover, who has so far evaded efforts of officers to apprehend him, following the murder of Will Poynter at Edmonton last Wednesday night. No motive has been determined but Hoover is said to have fired point blank five times at Poynter, killing him instantly. Poynter, a farmer, trader, and tobacco speculator, was a man of good standing in his community, and is survived by his wife and two small children.
