Automobile Tags on Sale At Reduced Rates. In conformity with the law passed just last year, automobile license tags are now on sale at the County Clerk's office at greatly reduced rates.

First Class at \$6.00 takes in Austins and a few other small cars; \$7.20 takes in Fords and other lighter cars of 31 horsepower down to 22 horsepower; tags for cars of more than 31 horsepower are \$12.00. A fee of 50 cents must be added to these rates for the County Clerk.

Time limit for obtaining tags has been extended by the Governor until February 10th.

Fatal Accident. Mr. Dee Murly, of near Burkesville, was killed almost instantly late last Wednesday in an automobile accident. Mr. Murly and three other citizens on horseback were coming toward Glasgow when they were overtaken by a truck loaded with tobacco which was coming to the Glasgow market. Mr. Murly's horse was frightened and jumped into the middle of the road right in front of the truck, too late for the driver to stop.
