The Glasgow Tuberculosis Hospital, one of the five new State Tuberculosis Sanatoria, serves as a treatment Center for tuberculosis patients in 17 counties of South Central Kentucky. Located on "hospital hill" in the northeaster section of Glasgow, it occupies a 31 acre tract. A modern Nurses Home, two picturesque auxiliary buildings for hospital executives & a combination laundry heating plant building dot the hospital premises in addition to the four story sanatorium.

New Uniforms for Policemen Here Glasgow's police force will get a "new look" in uniforms starting Monday. Chief Lyle said the force will begin wearing new summer uniforms then. The uniforms are powder-blue & have been tailored for the members of the force. Black stripes down the trouser legs replace the yellow stripes on the old outfits.

Another uniform change will be made this fall when the long jackets are replaced as part of the winter uniform with "Ike" jackets.

The uniform change was made to bring Glasgow's force on par with other cities which are discarding the old type uniform. This will aid the economy since the new uniforms are easier to keep looking neat & are more comfortable.

J. J. Newberry Store Announces Major Remodeling Project Here. The J. J. Newberry store in Glasgow will soon begin an extended remodeling program at its North Public Square location. This is the third remodeling stint of the store in its 24 year history in the city.

J. H. Tulloh, manager of the store for 22 of its 24 years here, said the remodeling would include morning a wall between the present store & the Thomas building next door; installation of a 30-stool lunch counter, extension of the Thomas building for 35 feet in the rear & construction of abasement sales room.

In the process, the display counters will be increased giving the store a total of 1980 feet. It presently has about 856 feet of counter space.

"This is the company's attempt to stay in step with the progress made in Glasgow," said Mr. Tulloh. The remodeling is to begin May 1 & completed around Oct. 15. The other remodeling

jobs were done in 1936 & 1940. The store will not close during the remodeling.
